



Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965

ESEA Flexible Learning Program

The Georgia Department of Education (GADOE) submitted to the U.S. Department of Education (US ED) an application requesting flexibility through waivers of ten Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) requirements and their associated, regulatory, administrative and reporting requirements. On February 9, 2012, Georgia’s Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) Flexibility Waiver was approved by the US ED. Two of the ten requested waivers directly affected supplemental educational services (SES) and public school choice (Choice). The waiver allows local educational agencies (LEAs) greater flexibility in designing a Flexible Learning Program (FLP). The FLP is an alternative supplemental academic intervention that allows flexibility in designing an extended learning program. The program is tailored to the needs of academically at-risk students in a school in order to provide additional assistance for students to achieve proficiency in relation to the state academic content standards, particularly in the areas of Language Arts and Math.

DeKalb Title I Priority, Focus, and Alert schools will offer an ESEA Flexible Learning Program for three years, beginning with the 2012-2013 school year. Students attending identified Title I Priority, Focus and Alert schools may qualify for receiving Flexible Learning Program instructional services per federal and state rank order guidelines.
